
Here's a first look at the renovated, reopened Kripalu Center for Yoga & Health after January flood damage



STOCKBRIDGE — During a recent tour of Kripalu Center for Yoga & Health's renovated main lobby and dining hall, CEO Robert Mulhall recalled what it was like to see a 5,000-gallon cascade of water pouring out of the

ceiling just over two months ago.

"This whole area had to be redone, but it looks beautiful," he said. "A tremendous amount of work was needed, and the team did a phenomenal job to make it all happen."



Days after a swarm of contractors completed their tasks, Kripalu reopened on March 29 and hosted a capacity of 450 weekend guests.






